INFLUENCE OF THE WHANGANUI RIVER

The Whanganui River is the defining thread of this rohe, of Whanganui. Through centuries of interbeing with the river, Whanganui hapū have developed a distinct and powerful tribal wisdom. Now codified in law and policy, this invitation has echoed around the world - inspiring pilgrimages to this place and campaigns for similar legislative leaps in other countries. This is Whanganui's greatest contribution yet to the global movement for redefining human relationship with(in) nature. Sustainable Whanganui Trust is inspired by this. All of our activities come from the rootstock of caring for Te Taiao, but thanks to the invitation of the Whanganui River, we now have a source of local inspiration, and kawa with which to assess and guide our small waka on this big river of positive change.

ENVIRCHUB

Sustainable Whanganui relocated to 23 Drews Ave in early 2024.

Our new Envirohub is our HQ and is home to many of our projects and events. At Drews Ave we provide Whanganui residents with a location to donate and repurpose useful items such as glass jars, fabric and sewing equipment, and garden equipment that would otherwise go to landfill. We have grown our range of eco-refill cleaning and health-care products. We have set up a much-expanded Green Bikes area. Traps can be borrowed from our Predator Free trap library. A small meeting room provides a space to host monthly creative children's workshops, and educational sessions.





Our staff are supported by a dedicated team of volunteers who assist shoppers and those seeking advice four days a week.

Funding has been secured to expand the retail space in late 2024 and we look forward to welcoming our visitors into an enlarged and improved space.

TOWARDS ZERO WASTE





Zero Waste Services

Education, event recycling and composting

Some of Whanganui's largest events have benefitted from Zero Waste Services: New Zealand Masters Games, Festival of Cultural Unity, and the Home & Lifestyle Show (contact Hadiesustainablewhanganui.org.nz)

Business Waste Audits

have been undertaken in diverse organisations such as supermarkets, hospitality, construction, manufacturing, retail, government, education, and local council.

Post-audit reviews showed, following implementation of SWS recommendations, that between 15-50% recyclable and compostable waste was diverted from landfill resulting in considerable cost savings in landfill fees.

GREENING WHANGANUI

Formerly Fruit Trees in Schools



Greening Whanganui is all about fostering community engagement to increase planting throughout Whanganui and we support our communities (kura, schools, marae, churches and other community groups) to achieve their planting/environmental goals for the wellbeing of people, and also our native fauna.

We provide education on growing natives and fruit trees/vegetables with easy access to resources to increase planting success and can help with the maintenance of supplied plants. Since 2008 we have planted hundreds of flourishing fruit and nut trees at over 60 kura.



PrFW is a new initiative that has recently come under the umbrella of SWT. PrFW exists to support a wide network of collaboration around the Whanganui Rohe towards national Predator Free 2050 goals. With a growing trap library and community-managed traplines in public spaces, Predator Free Whanganui seeks to combine local values and context with expert knowledge of pest control and trapping nationally.







Green Bikes is an open workshop where the Whanganui community can come and fix their own bikes. With friendly mechanics on hand to help, the focus is on learning how to DIY and providing access to our library of tools, building skills and knowledge in the community.

Funding secured from Horizon Regional Council's Climate Response Fund has enabled Green Bikes to become a "Park Tool School" authorised learning location.















Biking to school fosters independence and teaches responsibility. Children learn valuable life skills like planning their routes, managing time and taking care of their bicycles. While many Whanganui schools encourage their students to cycle and have a fleet of bicycles for training purposes, they lacked on-site skilled bike maintenance. Green Bikes has used funding from Lotteries to construct a bike-based mobile workshop that is taken to schools and community events to provide bike repairs. Supporting seven schools this year, repairs were made to 134 school bikes and a further 17 at kindergartens.

REPAIR CAFE









Repair Café Whanganui held its first event in March and is running monthly events until November. As at 1 July, 220 visitors had participated, 121 kg of potential waste had been prevented from landfill and 827 kg of CO2 emissions had been prevented from entering the atmosphere. And a total of 34 volunteers, including 19 repairers, have been involved. Repairs include clothes and soft toys; wooden, plastic and metal items; small electrical appliances; sewing machines; ceramics; leather goods; musical instruments and sound equipment; and costume jewellery.







KIDS CREATIVE SESSIONS

Open to all members of the community these monthly sessions allow children to use and develop their creative skills using donated and recycled items.

Offered free and including a shared morning tea, the emphasis is always on the "doing", not the final product.



Participants have made terraria, bug hotels, robots, homemade paper, leaf art, cardboard creations, sock animals and much more!

Sustainable Whanganui volunteers continued the tradition of having a stall at the Whanganui River Market on Saturday mornings during July; to promote and educate the public about simple but effective means by which they can live their lives with less plastic. We also decorated our shop window to remind passers by to get involved.
